structed a gargantuan inflatable suit "Make it Look Rich," which strides a thin line between spectacle and the absurd, and will be almost as tall as the building.

Maria Michails is an interdisciplinary artist whose art projects bridge the sciences, engineering and architecture. She is currently working on a mechanism resembling an old railway handcar. It will power a pump and irrigation system with video for a planter growing native prairie grass.
